Cars - New Success

We all know what the window stickers of new cars have done the last few years. A 9% inflation rate would look good compared to the rising prices seen in the showroom. New 911s start at \$106,100 and there is no such thing as a basic model available so \$130-\$160k is a reasonable place to start. Of course that is also the reason why used cars have held their value and vintage cars have continued their increases. That and more people chasing the cars of their youth. Values do peak at some point as those who were chasing them either found one or passed away. That is referred to as the "Model T effect". As the number of potential buyers decline the value also declines. There are exceptions, like history (raced at Indy in 1923), or ownership (Bonnie and Clyde's Ford) but for the most part as the years roll by the prices drop.

Model T's are a good example of a market cycle. Back when your grandfather was trying to relive his youth he would pay over \$30k (\$85k in today's dollars) for a fully restored Model T to drive in the Fourth of July Parade or show off to friends in his garage. With most Grandfathers of that generation gone to the big garage in the sky, a fully restored Model T struggles to bring \$12k in the marketplace.

Cars from the '40's and '50's have started their slow decline, think '49 Ford and '55 Chevy. Imported cars of that same period seem to be holding steady and cars from the '70's and '80's are still headed upward. Porsche 911's from the big bumper era ('74 and on) have brought some really big numbers lately. Even the lowly 911 SC that we all ignored for years are over \$50k with some breaking \$100k.

There is also some good news for owners of early cars that I discovered last month while I was solving a brake problem.



The '72 911 that I autocross had a front rotor that was warped so I ordered replacements and was surprised to find that they were only \$31 each (plus shipping). Even rotors from the Porsche Dealer were only \$58. That prompted me to check the price of front rotors on the other 911 (actually a 991) in the garage. That car has the composite brake system

(PCCB) and I knew they were pricy but I didn't expect to find them at \$4200. Each. That is more than we used to pay for new cars. The standard rotor (non PCCB) was \$925.

The rears had been making a noise but after replacing the front rotors and bleeding the system I didn't hear anything so off I went. After the first PCA autocross event I noticed that one rear brake was warmer than the fronts when I got home so it was time to take a closer look. Turns out that because it is driven so little (not good) a rear caliper had seized and needed to be rebuilt. I remember that years ago we could just drop off the calipers at the local auto parts store and they had a guy that would rebuild them in a few days. As I recall, the cost was about \$50 each. Nobody does that anymore, something about liability and lawsuits.

Checking with a local shop it looked like the rebuild kits were cheap, just \$16 for each caliper, but it was going to take a couple of hours to rebuild each one. A quick check with a west coast 911 site found completely rebuilt units for only \$185 and free shipping and no core required. At that price I could afford to replace both rears. Done. Even the replacement pads were cheap at \$36 for a set, enough for both rear corners.

Modern cars require larger brakes, both calipers and pads and those prices are \$630 and \$175 respectively. So there really is a financial advantage to working on older cars. Of course the cost of labor is the same on both old and newer cars so that's a another reason to buy a book as we used to say, now it's "go on You Tube" and learn to DIY. See what I did there?

It does seem that the time of working on your own car, at least a modern car, has passed. Between computers that run everything and cladding that covers the drivetrain, both top and bottom, there is no real place for an owner to start. That's a shame because one of the real victories in life, I believe. is confronting a problem and solving it yourself. Certainly the cost figures in there somewhere but there are plenty of places to save money in life. There aren't many places for personal success in life that are so immediate as fixing a car in your garage. I think that is what I like about working on cars, success is immediate. Of course, so is failure and I've had a few of those but that just means that I have to do it again.

Other hobbies are similar. Woodworkers come up with great creations whether it's a bookcase or an end table. If it doesn't look the way they want they just do it over. Ceramics is another hobby with a very high success rate. Speedy results and redos are easy. Gardeners can see the fruits of their labor, it just takes longer and is at the mercy of weather.

But you can't drive those hobbies around the block for all to see. Even if nobody is looking, a completed repair is a great feeling as you're driving down the road.
