

### Presidents Message— April 2021

The Club Schedule for the year has been completed, and you will find it here in this issue of the Tub Times and online at our Club website: <a href="https://www.typ356ne.org/schedule-of-events">https://www.typ356ne.org/schedule-of-events</a>.

We have a very full schedule this year. The Club schedule not only lists all our Club events, but in addition it lists many of the major national events with links that you can click on to get full details of these events. So, hopefully our Club schedule will be a one stop shop for most of your car event needs.

Please note, that the Club strongly advises that you be fully vaccinated for COVID-19 before attending any Club events this year. In addition, even if vaccinated, you should always wear a mask at Club events unless you are eating and drinking in the area provided for that. The current size limit for indoor gatherings in Massachusetts is 25 with the outdoor limit being 50. Since our initial Club event in April is outdoor, we should be OK with the 50 limit. Our first indoor event is on May 8<sup>th</sup>. If the indoor group limit has not increased above 25 by then, we may have to make some adjustment.



They have several monthly local group gatherings and have one big event every year that they try to locate in the center of Florida. That event is called "The Gathering of The Faithful" or just GOF.

The nice thing about Florida is that you can drive your car all year round. Therefore, to avoid the hot summers, the GOF is held in February. Dual member, Diane Mierz, attended the event this year and sent this report along with some pictures. As you can see, there were a number of outstanding Tubs there. Thank you Diane.

One of my favorite things to do while down in Florida in February is to attend the Florida Owner's Group "GOF—Gathering of the Faithful". There's usually a great turnout of 356s and FOG members at a beautiful venue and it really helps get one through the mid winter doldrums of the Northeast. This year, despite concerns with COVID, did not disappoint!

The event was held at the Mission Inn's Pavilion on Lake Harris in Howey-in-the Hills, Florida. Howey-In-the-Hills is located in Central Florida, just off the Florida turnpike and about 2 hours from Vero Beach where I started out from early the morning of February 27. They day couldn't have been nicer – sunny and in the 80s and the show field was flanked by a lake complete with Spanish moss-covered trees. Absolutely gorgeous!

The field was filled with 34 356s; 4 Speedsters, 3 Convertible Ds, 2 Carreras (one with its 4 cam evident, the other had its deck lid closed), and a large assortment of A, B and C coupes and convertibles.



# How to Buy a Tub

The following is the second of a series of articles by Tom Tate intended to help someone purchase a 356

# The Secrets

While the last article helped our dear readers decide what kind of buyer they were, this installment will actually get into some of the steps needed when buying a 356. It really isn't that different than buying any used car in the initial stages. It's all about doing your homework.

The very first step would be to narrow down your search to what year and model suits you and your budget. 356A models strike some as the proper car with their low to the ground look and pointed hood. The '60-'61 T5 cars were the first with the raised bumpers and higher headlights to meet US Federal rules but with the gas tank fill in the front trunk and drum brakes they remain the least expensive of all the models. The '64/'65 C and SC models were what some call the "finished product" and are considered to be the best road car of all.

Open cars are priced higher in the market place that coupes and some of the more rare versions are at the very top. Think: Convertible D's, twin Grill Roadsters and Speedsters in that order. Take the time to come to a conclusion based upon both looks and budget, it will save you a lot of time searching.

When it comes to any 50 year old car history is important. You need to find out where it's been all these years. It makes a big difference as to condition, both seen and unseen, if it has been in the hands

of a single owner or family all those years. You would want to know if the candidate is an ex race car converted back to street use. Race cars that weren't worth a lot back in the day tended to be driven hard and put away wet. That's not a good practice if you're looking for a car that has been gently cared for over the years. Since it is a pretty small number of cars and a small community of owners it's not that tough to track a car back through its previous ownership. Spend the time, it's worth it.

The actual car inspection is the easiest part. Have a pre purchase inspection (PPI) done by someone who is experienced in these old Tubs. That will not be a Porsche dealer as most

technicians weren't born when these cars were built. There are some local shops (and members) that really know their way around these cars and would be happy to help. The 356 Registry members from around the US can also be a valuable resource, don't forget them. I would also suggest that anyone looking for a Tub follow the auctions, and more importantly, the comments on the auctions on the website "Bring a Trailer". Lots of experts there that have pointed out things that even I didn't know about these old cars.

Have fun and KTF

Ed note- Tubs are relatively rare cars, especially compared to Chevys, Fords and VWs. Some models and years are rarer than others. I thought that it would be interesting to see how many were built of each model 50–60 years ago. On the following page is a table from the 356 Registry website that gives you all of the production number data for the various model 356s.

There are also serial number tables available that would be useful. They are too big to include here, however, sources like the Stoddard Catalog has a large amount of useful information about 356s.



# Production Numbers -- Volume of 356s Produced by Model & Year

The evolution of the 356 was constant throughout its production history. Changes were introduced in the middle of a model year, necessitating inspection of the manufacturing year as well as the sales model year. Below is a table of total production numbers for each manufacturing year as well as details for each of the 8 most popular models. These numbers are derived from chassis serial number ranges. Represented in these figures but not broken out are the engine types: "Normal", "Super", "S90", "Carrera" and "Carrera2". This extra info will require difficult investigation into the <a href="Kardex data">Kardex data</a> on all cars.

# Four Speeds and Drum Brakes by Tom Tate

# Spring has Sprung

#### **Prepping Your Car For Spring Driving**

Spring has finally reached the north country and it is time to bring our prized 356s out of winter hibernation. The procedure for restoring life to your car is quite simple, especially if you did the fall preparation properly. I'll get to that next fall in another article.

The following is the procedure:

- Make sure your battery is fully charged (you did remove it and periodically charge it or keep it on a trickle charger for the winter, didn't you?).
- Install said battery, making sure that the terminals are clean.
- 3. Now is the time to remove any impediments you deployed to foil rodent intrusions. If you plugged up the tail pipe, cooling air intake, or air cleaner intake, remove the restrictions Also, if you placed moth balls anywhere in the car, remove them.
- Check the engine oil level and add oil if needed.
- Remove the large wire that goes from the center of the coil to the center of the ignition distributor.
- 6. Crank over the engine for five or six ten second periods allowing five seconds between crankings. This will get up some oil pressure and redistribute oil on the internal working surfaces of the engine. This will also get some fuel into the carbs.
- Reconnect the wire from the center of the coil to the center of the distributor.
- 8. Crank over engine again and it should start. Do not rev the engine, allow it to idle as best as it can. You want to make sure that you have plenty of oil circulation. It will probably run poorly during this phase. Allow it to idle like this for ten to twenty seconds. Now you can rev it up a bit to clear out the carbs. When the carbs are cleared out and the car seems to run well, shut it down.
- 9. Reset tire pressures to your desired pressures.
- 10. Time for the first ride of the season. Take it easy for the first few miles, allowing everything to warm up. Allow for some brake noises for the first few miles, especially on the disc brake cars. Allow for some tire thumping, especially if you did not increase the tire pressure enough for winter storage. You are now ready to enjoy the driving season.

#### Travel Kit

The following are my recommendations for a travel kit which can be put together pretty inexpensively. It can save you being stuck in North Podunk waiting for simple parts to get you back on the road after a breakdown. I have included approximate discount prices.

- 1. Fan belt. Less than \$8.00
- Both fan belt pulley halves. Less than \$20.00 for both halves.
- Distributor cap and rotor (especially for those with an "050" distributor, as the required cap and rotor don't fit anything else in the galaxy). Less than \$20.00
- 4. Ignition points. Less than \$7.00.
- Accelerator connector. (This part goes under the car in the rear. You won't even know you have one until it breaks, then try to find one at Pep Boys.) Less than \$20.00 for the latest fail safe version.
- Three feet of fuel hose (the good German braided stuff). Less than \$5.00.
- 7. Two quarts of engine oil. Less than \$5.00.

I have purposely kept this list short. These are the basics and will cover most of the common breakdowns. Carrying a test light, some wire, terminal connectors, a Swiss Army knife and your car's tool kit will get you through many embarrassing moments. Ask me sometime and I'll tell you what you can fix with some domestic car radiator hose, silicone seal, and hose clamps on a Sunday night in upstate New York.




