

# PRESIDENTS MESSAGE- JULY 2023

I just returned from our Club's June Summer Tour in Greenville Maine. Despite the prediction of significant rain each day we got almost none. The weather on the 5-hour drive to Greenville was clear and sunny the whole way. It was somewhat cloudy the next day, Saturday, for our 2-hour boat tour of Moosehead Lake on the 102-foot ex-Steam Ship Katahdin now converted to diesel engines. However, the rain held off for the entire cruise except for light sprinkles for a few minutes at the beginning of the cruise.

The Katahdin was built in 1914 at the Bath Iron Works for the Coburn Steamship Company, and is the oldest vessel afloat built



at Bath. It was shipped in sections to Greenville, where the final assembly took place. The primary use when launched was to deliver tourists and supplies to the Mount Kineo Resort from Greenville Junction, but it also offered cruises on the lake. Its hull is steel with two wooden decks. It was fully restored in the 1990's by a local nonprofit the Moosehead Marine Museum. It still has an enclosed passenger section on two decks and an open area for passengers on the stern and at the bow. For a portion of the tour, temporarily appointed co-captains, Ken and Gloria Nykiel took over steering of the vessel. The tour took us over a portion of the 118 square mile Moosehead Lake. We saw the two largest of the over 80 islands on the lake, Sugar Island (4,208 acres) and Deer Island. After the cruise we toured the Moosehead Maritime Museum that explains the long industrial logging history of the lake in the 19th and 20th centuries. Steamboats in those days towed thousands of logs corralled by boom chains to the East Outlet of Moosehead Lake, which were then released down the Kennebec River to southerly markets.

The only significant rain we had fortunately occurred while we were inside at dinner Saturday night. By the time dinner was over many of us were able to walk the short distance back to the hotel since the rain was over. We did not encounter any of Maine's notorious black flies while we were there. However, there were a fair number of no see ums (aka biting midges) that did leave a few itchy bites on those of us, like me, that did not apply some bug repellant. An occasional mosquito was also seen.

On Sunday five members of our group headed home while eight of us stayed for one more day. It was again dry all day. We took a brief tour of the small town of Monson a few miles south of Greenville. We had lunch at a very nice local brew house, The Turning Page Farm Brewery. On their outdoor deck we dined and enjoyed their homemade brew overlooking the goats that grazed nearby. Dinner that night was at The Birches Resort down a well packed dirt road deep in Rockwood, Maine. The meal was outstanding, and after the meal several of us fed the large group of local ducks and their newborns some cracked corn.

On Monday we all headed home with some light rain off and on during the return trip. The fan belt on my 1963, 356B coupe broke about 20 miles from home. Fortunately, it was not raining at that time. I was close to an I 95 interstate exit and was able to pull into a parking lot before my engine overheated and change the belt with one of the two spares I always carry with me. I was assisted in this effort by a local, retired passerby that was eager to help since he was so interested in my car. Remember to always carry your tool kit and a few spare parts. They will at some point come in handy if you drive your car a lot like I do.

Don't forget Tom Coughlin's upcoming, always very enjoyable, and scenic, South Coastal Massachusetts and Rhode Island drive plus lunch on Tuesday, July 11<sup>th</sup>. If you have not been on Tom's annual tour before, don't miss it this year. You will have a great time!

Mark your calendars now and let us know if you are interested. No commitments are needed yet. We will follow up with you to address questions or seek your contact info if you plan to attend.







# **Spring Tour 2023 — Moosehead Lake, Maine** by Diane Mierz

I had been looking forward to the early summer tour since Allen sent a notice out about it almost a year ago. The distance door to door was 400 miles but I had SpeedSport prepare the 356 to make the trek and Steve and I had taken it out for a shake down run of about 100 miles the Monday before. Initially weather looked like it might cooperate but as the weekend drew near the chance of rain every day except the drive up Friday made us move to Plan B; our trusty, weather tight Miata with wipers which actually make contact with the windshield. No need for Rain-x with this choice!

Our son Matt accompanied me and true to predictions the weather on the ride up was perfect. We stopped in Freeport at the Maine Beer Company (if you haven't tried their beer "Lunch" you are truly missing out on something special) and to hit LL Bean's outlet store. We made it to Greenville around 4 just about the same time others were arriving. Allen had booked The Greenville Inn for us to stay and it was absolutely glorious! The Inn itself dates back to 1890 and original was home to William Shaw, a wealthy lumber baron. It took 10 years to construct and sits on a hill overlooking the east cove of Moosehead lake. The cool thing about the Inn was that most of the main floor was set aside to relax in and the porch which flanked the house was set up with rocking chairs so we could sit with refreshments, converse, and take in the stunning views. Downstairs was original as well with mahogany and quarter sawn oak trim everywhere and the lights in the parlor were rumored to be Tiffany. A beautiful stained glass window of a pine tree adorned the main staircase to upstairs. In addition to accommodations in the mansion one could choose a private cabin as well.

Allen Sisson was the only club member brave enough to take his 356 and Peter Venuti and Diane drove his black Convertible D replica. Peter and Joyce Thompson drove their Boxster and Sid Wilde drove a pretty cool air cooled Westfalia VW bus. Ken and Gloria Nykiel and Bob and Fran DiCorpo drove their modern iron.

Dinner Friday was at Kelly's Landing, situated right on Moosehead Lake. We enjoyed cocktails on the deck and a great dinner. We were treated to a 2 hour tour through west cove up to Moose Island and Beaver cove. # Four Speeds and Drum Brakes by Tom Tate

Cars and Coffee didn't seem necessary because cars were out of the garage driving before April Fools Day. On April 2<sup>nd</sup> the draw was still there when 60 P cars arrived at a C&C set up by the Slocum's in RI.



The All Porsche Swap Meet in Carlisle PA the end of April was threatened, as always, with rain but that didn't stop the hard core and sales were brisk. Maybe the fact that I've gotten more realistic about the value of old car parts helped move the merchandise. Looking around the garage I have come to the conclusion that my treasures are going to wind up at the dump unless I get them back into the market where someone, anyone, can use them. If you make things cheap enough people will buy parts they don't even need. That's how so much stuff followed me home.

The first Track Day for your author was the beginning of April at Watkins Glen. That was where the loyal reader will remember I rolled a BMW into a ball last year. This year was much better. 

These heavy American cars seldom do well but this Olds was an exception. Reasonably well set up and very well driven it was faster than most Porsches. The

# **TubTech**

#### Oil filter Canister Gaskets by Ed Tobolski

If you change the oil in your 356 yourself, you may of noticed that the oil filter cover gaskets don't fit properly, they are too big. I just did a non-scientific study on the gaskets and here is what I found.

There are basically two different brand oil filters used on our 356s, H-Filter and Fram. Other than the decal labels, it's impossible to tell them apart externally. They look the same and use the same filters and gaskets, with only internal differences. I happen to have one of each. A Fram in my A coupe (with a B engine) and a H-Filter as a spare. I was trying to fix a leaking cover on the Fram (I found a cracked seating surface in the cover) and realized the differences between the two units. The bolts and bolt holes in the covers are different, therefore, I can not take the cover and bolt from the H-Filter and put it on the Fram.

While dealing with this problem I decided to look deeper into the poor fitting gasket issue. The new gasket that came with the filter is too big for the Fram cover, see pictures. It did fit the H-Filter better but still a little tight. I went to Stoddard and ordered new gaskets. They list 2 different gaskets and I got a couple of each. The ODs of both seemed the same but the IDs were different due to the width of the sealing surfaces, see the details below.

- 546-07-829, Dark color, .028in. thick, with a .190in. wide, sealing surface.
- NLA-07-829, Green color, with black markings, .034in. thick, with a .230in. wide sealing surface. Note—This gasket feels softer than the 546.

Conclusions—Both of these gaskets will fit in the H-Filter cover . The 546 07 829 unit fits the Fram the best. The NLA-078-829 will also fit the Fram, but it is just a little tight. It is reasonable to assume that the H-Filter cover is slightly larger than the Fram cover. I'm currently using the 546 in the Fram in my 356 and so far no leaks. Ed




